Education, Literacy, or Internet Safety

Verizon is one of the country's largest corporate philanthropies and plans to provide millions of dollars in 2009 for grant requests. Funding is provided for education, literacy and internet safety. Given the volume of applications Verizon receives, it would be most helpful if WMS can identify a Verizon employee through which to leverage this proposal.

The site also provides free access to Verizon's 'Thinkfinity' Literacy Network, which is an online resource for literacy instructors, tutors, teachers and parents which provides tools to advance literacy and learning. Funding for internet safety focuses on teaching children and teens how to protect themselves when using the Net, and parent/caregiver training on how to help children use the Net safely. Online applications are accepted between 1/1 and 10/31 of each year. Grant sizes are not specified, but have averaged between \$5-10 thousand. The web site provides sample grants and application tips.

PSE&G's Environmental Education Grants program has been in effect for almost 20 years. PSE&G's 2009 areas of interest are global warming, climate change initiatives, renewables, conservation, community greening and energy efficiency. The program focuses on inspiring teachers to implement an interdisciplinary approach to teaching about the environment, and foster new ideas.

With a yearly budget of \$25,000, grants are made up to \$3,500 per project. The program is available to teachers of grades K-9 who can successfully link a student's understanding of science, math, computer science and/or technology concepts with an appreciation for the environment. Funds can be requested for equipment, materials and field trips that would not normally be provided by the school or district. 2009's grant deadline was June 5, 2009, and the program is offered at roughly the same time every year. The website provides suggestions of different approaches that can be adapted to a particular teacher's needs.

West Milford is in the North/Central Jersey market, and application deadlines for its Local Heroes competition are announced early in the year, and are generally due by June 30th. Five awardees are chosen, and each receives \$5,000.00 for an organization of their choice. By way of information, this year, this market received less than three dozen applications from the entire top half of the state, so chances are strong that a good application can be awarded. It is strongly recommended that a concerted effort be put forth to identify a number of candidates, and then work to submit as many high quality applications as possible in the next round.

NAEIR is a highly reputable 32 year old company that functions as a clearing house for manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers that want to donate a wide range of office furniture, equipment, supplies, etc. NAEIR only accepts new merchandise that members have stated they need in the administration of their schools and nonprofit organizations. It then makes these items available via catalogs and on-line ordering to members on a first come first served basis. Since inception, NAEIR has distributed over \$2.6 billion in merchandise to schools and non-profits. Donors use the service as a convenient way to clear out warehouses, avoid liquidation processes, and obtain federal income tax deductions. Members pay a fee to gain access to its resources. There are thousands of donor companies including Microsoft, Gillette, Russ Berrie, and General Electric.

AREA BANKS

Many corporations provide community involvement or grant programming for employees. As is further described in the Resource Development section, WMS should attempt to create an initiative around learning where parents/caregivers work, and finding out about their gift matching programs, volunteer programs, and outright granting for organizations with which their employees or families are involved.

The value of this list is to have WMS personnel review it to see if they have personal knowledge of any of the groups.
