



Literary Award Winner By Matthew Strianse


West Milford High School Named NJ School of Character by Matthew Strianse

al America, and the Brooks Family, the only Black American Family in US History with three generals in the immediate family (a father and two sons.)



Congratulations to Melissa for this well deserved recognition.







Updates from the Business Office

The 2024-2025 Public Budget Hearing will take place tonight, as part of the West Milford Township Public Schools Board of Education Meeting. Dr. Furnari and I will present an update on the Preliminary Budget that we shared back in March 2024. The budget was approved by the Passaic County Executive Superintendent, and is now ready for the Board's consideration. This budget was crafted with a critical eye on identifying efficiencies, which enabled us to include several positions that will enhance pro-

gramming at all of our schools.

The District received a reduction in State Aid for the 2024-2025 school year in the amount of \$81,537, bringing the total reductions since the implementation of S2 to a total \$9,121,140. This has made maintaining the fiscal health of our schools challenging, but we are confident that this budget meets our District's vision, mission and goals. The District also absorbed instructional support positions that have been paid for using federal grant funds (ESSER). The ARP ESSER III grant period will conclude at the end of September 2024, so these Encore positions will now be partially funded using our local budget. The Encore program is essential to our ability to provide instructional support to students in Reading and Math. Other areas addressed in this budget include class-size at all schools, program enhancements in Language Arts and Math, special education programming, instructional technology, and facilities improvements.

I would like to thank the entire administrative team, the Board Operations & Finance Committee and members of my staff for their hard work and input regarding the 2024-2025 budget.
