

Phishing Scams Are On The Rise. Don't Get Hooked! By Robert Winston

Phishing is a type of online scam that has become increasingly common in recent years. The goal of phishing is to trick people into giving away their personal information, such as passwords or credit card numbers. Phishing scams usually start with an email

or message that appears to be from a reputable source, such as a bank or social media site.

The message will ask the recipient to click on a link which will then direct them to a fake website that looks like the real thing. Once on the fake website, the user will be asked to enter their personal information, which is then captured by the scammer.

To avoid falling victim to a phishing scam, it's important to always be cautious when receiving emails or messages from unknown sources. Never click on links or download attachments unless you are absolutely sure they are legitimate. Additionally, make sure to keep your software and security systems up to date to help protect against these types of attacks.

Remember, if something seems too good to be true, it probably is. Stay vigilant and protect yourself from phishing scams.

A typical gift card phishing scam works like this: the scammer sends an email or text message to the victim, claiming to be a representative of a well-known company, such as Amazon or Walmart. The message informs the victim that they have won a gift card

or that there is a problem with their gift card and they need to take action to resolve the issue.

The message will often contain a link to a fake website that looks like the real thing, where the victim is asked to enter their personal information, such as their name, address, and credit card details. In some cases, the victim is asked to download a software program or app that will supposedly help them redeem their gift card.

Once the scammer has obtained the victim's personal information, they can use it for a variety of fraudulent activities, including making unauthorized purchases or opening credit accounts in the victim's name.

To protect yourself from gift card phishing scams, it's important to be cautious when receiving unsolicited emails or text messages. Always verify the legitimacy of the message by contacting the company directly through their official website or customer service line. Be wary of offers that seem too good to be true, and never provide personal information or download software from an unknown source. (continued on page 8)

Example: Gift Card Phishing Scam #2

In this type of phishing scam, the victim receives an email from someone impersonating someone the victim trusts, such as a friend or colleague. The scammer typically claims that they are in trouble and needs the victim to purchase gift cards from a specific retailer and provide the scammer with the card numbers and PINs.

The scammer may use a variety of tactics to convince the victim to comply, such as threatening legal action, promising a refund or bonus, or claiming that the victim's personal information has been compromised. The victim may be instructed to purchase multiple gift cards in varying amounts and to provide the scammer with the card numbers and PINs over the phone or via email.

Once the scammer has obtained the gift card information, they can use it to make purchases or cash withdrawals, often with little chance of being caught or prosecuted.

To protect yourself from this type of phishing scam, it's important to be wary of unsolicited emails that request personal information or payment. Never provide gift card information or other sensitive information over the phone or via email, and be wary of any request that seems suspicious or too good to be true.

WMHS Students Attend Conference at Rutgers University by Sharon West





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

The Football Team participated in numerous team building and community events this season, as well as, winning key games against Nutley, Highpoint, Northern Valley Demarest, and Jef-


ferson. Through the guidance of Coach Maslanek and his staff, the football team supported the band at their 2nd Annual Home



The field hockey team advanced again to the Passaic County Championships and had a lot of success under the leadership


