
A Message from Special Services by Dr. Derek Ressa

Park Ranger Visits Paradise Knoll School

Park Ranger, Tim Minor, with the Passaic County Parks and Recreation Department, came into our 5th grade science classrooms with Mr. Leslie to help students understand and apply the difference between a food chain and food web. Students were able to grasp this concept and gain an understanding through predator and prey activity and by constructing a food web. By the end of the lesson, stu-



dents understood that all energy starts with the sun and why animals on the second and third tier need to eat a lot more to stay alive. Once students understood that activity they discussed what an ecosystem was and the different types of ecosystems we have on Earth. Then each group received different animals (first level, second level, Apex predators/consumers), plants, decomposers, etc. for



their ecosystems. Students were asked to build a quick food web showing their understanding of the transfer of energy or The Pyramid of Life. By the end of the lesson, each group shared with their classmates how each ecosystem works and survives.

Students Explore Collisions at High Speed by Dr. Bryan Belser



Former West Milford student Kyle Gilroy (class of 2007) returned to West Milford High

School on January 23 rd to assist Physics teacher Mr. Rose with a lesson on projectile velocity in his classes throughout the day. Kyle brought a high-end camera able to capture the impact of a 1-inch steel ball into a ham and a water bottle at ~100 m/s. Physics students in mainly 11th and 12th grade applied their knowledge of the law of inertia while viewing the impact in real time as well as a slowed down recording. The AP physics class used details of the impact to relate to energy conversion. The impact of the steel ball into a water bottle helped further launch a discussion on cavitation which can relate to submarines and

underwater detection of sound.

West Milford Lions Partner With Our Schools





One of our main service projects is free eye screening for children ages pre-K to 1st Grade. It began in 2007 in the daycares, preschools, and public elementary schools in West Milford. Today, this important service project has expanded to 36 schools and daycares in 16 towns. The children are screened by Club members using a state-of-the-art camera for possible eye disorders that include Amblyopia, Myopia, Anisometropia, Strabismus,

Astigmatism, Gaze, and more. Detections are referred to a nearby ophthalmologist for evaluation and follow-up testing. In 2023, the West Milford Lions Club screened over 1,200 children, of which 10% had detections.

Each year, our Club offers scholarships for graduating seniors at West Milford High School. Scholarship applications are available through the WMHS Guidance Department, and the award winners are presented at the Senior Awards Night.

The West Milford Lions Club has been sponsoring the Lions International Peace Poster Contest at Macopin Middle School for more than 30 years. This special and heartwarming project gives students (ages 11-13) the opportunity to express their visions of peace and inspire the world through art and creativity. In 2003, Macopin art student Rebecca Young was among the top 24 winners in the world, out of more than 300,000 entries! Our local Club awards a

1st Place winner and Runner-up winner with prizes and recognition each year, and the 1st Place winner moves on to NJ Lions District 16-N judging. The District winner goes on to State judging and the State winner is submitted to Lions International judging. Other West Milford Lions Club programs, support, and participating community


Character Education Class is a new course adopted by 6th and 7th grade Macopin students. Students are learning how to create a culture

West Milford Guidance & School Counseling Submitted by Karen Johnson

Our new **Steps** sessions were provided to parents and students in grades 9, 11 & 12 in September. Grade 9 parents were provided with an orientation to all things WMHS (**First Steps**) with the goal of supporting student success and involvement as a Highlander. Our grade 11 program, **Next Steps**, provided a kick off to post secondary planning, exploration and preparation. Our Grade 12 meeting focused on those **Final Steps** that will lead to a successful transition to post secondary pathways.

Financial Aid Night for families preparing for post secondary education was presented in October and a **FAFSA Workshop** took place in January.

We are very grateful to Nick Capodice, Director of Financial Aid at St. Elizabeth University, who joined us as a representative from the NJ Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA). HESAA provides FREE presentations in schools around the state regarding financial aid for post-high school education. Nick guided us through a lot of information at our Financial Aid Night, and joined us again to assist our Senior families in completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid in January. There have been many glitches and a lot of confusion with the new FAFSA, and this was a great opportunity to complete the FAFSA with assistance.

Also in January, we met with parents of our rising grade 9 families to provide a **Scheduling Orientation** for the high school. We are currently meeting with individuals to review and discuss course requests for 2024-25 to ensure students are on the right track and preparing themselves to meet future goals.

On-Site Decision Day!

On December 7, WMHS hosted 28 colleges for an on site admissions event. On-Site Decision Day gives our students the chance to participate in face to face interviews with college admissions professionals while earning early acceptances. 88 WMHS seniors participated, many meeting with admissions counselors from multiple schools. Our stu-

dents earned a total of 238 acceptances at the event! Though not all colleges could give scholarships that day, the offers continue to come in. The total amount of scholarship money offered to our students via this event thus far is well over \$200,000.


West Milford High School Cheerleading


